School Vision

The number of Catholic students was 46 making up 6.8% of the total student population.

Staff

The total number of staff at the school is 82. This includes the Principal, teaching staff, support staff made up of laboratory technicians, teaching assistants, administrative support staff, and janitorial staff.

The turnover rate is slightly lower than that of the previous year. Colleagues who have chosen to leave the School are not those who have been here for a long time. This may suggest that newer staff members are struggling to feel a strong enough sense of belonging. In general though, the overall sense of belonging of colleagues in School is acceptable with colleagues with a tenure of four or more years opting to remain with us.

2. Achievements and Reflection on Major Concerns; Feedback on Future Planning

Major Concern 1:

To further consolidate the generic skills of our students to enable them to become reflective learners.

- To sustain faculty learning on the concepts of generic skills and reflective learning.
- > To engage students in quality activities which help them to consolidate their generic skills and become reflective learners.

ACHIEVEMENTS

With this academic year marking the end of this Development Cycle and this set of Major Concerns, the School continued to have a theme related to the pursuing of dreams. This year, our theme was "Keep Calm and Dream On" which had the aim of reminding students to continue striving for success in different areas and to keep reaching for new heights. A video series was also created and shared with the school highlighting the thoughts and opinions of some of our exemplary alumni on the theme of chasing their dreams.

1.1 To sustain faculty learning on the concepts of generic skills and reflective learning.

For the duration of the past three years, faculty learning and the development of understanding of the generic skills, Gibbs' Learning Cycle, SAMR model, and establishing a culture of reflection have been at the forefront of our daily operation. In this final year of the Cycle, the learning and consolidation process for teachers has not slowed down. Professional sharing sessions on these different elements continued with a focus on how they are implemented by different teachers. These sessions took on an emphasis on the sharing of best practices rather than emphasising on the basics, and collaboration between members of the panels have been fruitful.

To take learning to the next level and to ensure continuation of knowledge and experiences, the English Department established a mentorship programme in which teachers with more experience were paired up with newer teachers. Fundamentals of teaching and lesson planning were completed collaboratively under the mutual guidance and support of the teachers involved. The mentorship programme was well received by panel members and fostered greater professionalism, knowledge interflow, and relationships.

To better enhance teacher professionalism, teachers visited different schools such as Yuen Long Merchant Association Secondary School and Pui Shing Catholic Secondary School to learn more about the use of STEM in learning and teaching. Professional development sessions related to the incorporation of AI technology into L&T, hydroponics, and the usage of the newly installed smart whiteboards were also conducted to upgrade the knowledge of colleagues when it comes to the use of the latest technologies.

Teachers made use of past statistics to better inform the learning and teaching of students. By regularly reviewing the effectiveness of L&T materials in relation to S6 performance in the HKDSE, centralised teaching notes were modified to remedy any shortcomings within the existing curriculum and frameworks.

Our teachers have continued to review and update the materials that are made available to our students through online platforms such as Moodle. Self-study videos, exercises, and quizzes have been uploaded to the platform and links for YouTube videos related to specific topics, such as geographical topics for Geography students, have been provided. Gamified learning continues to be utilised through platforms such as Kahoots to encourage SRL and maintain interest while student-led reflection conferences for some subjects, such as small group revision sessions during S6 study leave, have been moved to Zoom. In PE, students were provided with videos from which they can learn techniques and skills prior to demonstrations in class. These have helped students get a better grasp of the movements prior to being able to actually practice them in class, effectively streamlining the L&T process in PE lessons.

The upgrading of facilities in the school, such as the complete overhaul of all blackboards and upgrading to smart whiteboards has facilitated the implementation of SAMR methods. Students are able to more fluidly and effectively present their findings when giving presentations. Visual presentation of art related materials were also more effectively completed by making use of the new screens. Furthermore, the greater incorporation of the use of iPads facilitates L&T as well as group work.

To keep abreast of rapidly changing trends, the powers of artificial intelligence has been emphasised for both teachers and students. Teacher training on the use of AI in the creation of lesson materials have been helpful in reducing teacher workload and in preparing teachers in effectively utilising AI in class. The English Department has been collaborating with HKUST to create and incorporate AI powered VR tools in providing tools for students to obtain regular and authentic practice in preparation for their speaking examinations. The usage of AI in marking composition with the aim of providing greater opportunities for practice has also been explored by the English Department as we prepare students for the public examinations.

Many processes and tasks in the school have been moved to electronic means as we embrace the SAMR model. Questionnaires and surveys have been moved online and tools such as Google Forms are regularly used to collect students' thoughts and reflections while feedback on events and activities have also been gathered. Certain activities have also been moved online to facilitate completion such as MCED's Top Ten News election which was gathered through Moodle and Social Service Records which were collected through Google Form. C&PR even made use of a new e-ticketing system to streamline the proceedings for Info Day. These included the use of QR codes to speed up the registration process. These systems were also shared with colleagues during a staff meeting.

In the continued effort to develop our reflective culture in school, a thorough review of textbooks and resources was conducted to strengthen the connection between the junior and senior form curriculums. This initiative included modifying the curriculums to address areas of learning and teaching, guided by feedback from examination results. Content being taught in different subjects was also adjusted to reflect the most updated changes to the curriculum. These changes have also occurred after changes in textbook selection and usage.

Having identified shortcomings in student performance and/or curriculum design, steps are continuously taken to improve and to enhance student capabilities and learning. Surveys were conducted after Maths training courses to collect feedback and suggestions. 96% were satisfied with the courses. Online self-assessments were conducted to assess student performance in C&SD. Computer Literacy courses have been updated to incorporate and emphasise AI, Python programming, and Robotic control and programming. In Economics, more challenging questions were introduced to further push the S5 and S6 cohorts while updated news related to economics is shared with students through WhatsApp to help them keep abreast of changes and to apply economics concepts in their analysis of the news.

Students are also provided plenty of opportunities for reflection both on their studies as well as on themselves. Student performance statistics from across the years is compiled and presented to students when relevant to give them a better understanding of their standing and their performance when compared to others on similar papers and tasks. Documents that facilitate feedback when comparing their own performance with those of previous cohorts have been created to guide the reflection process. The reflection process also incorporates peer feedback and evaluation, giving students more data to better inform their own evaluations and reflections. Spiritually, a spiritual diary for students to reflect on their learning journey and experiences in social service has been created. Students can also utilise dedicated pages within the Student Handbook that assists in ensuring reflection prior to leading parent-teacher conferences that take place at the start of each Parents Day.

The concerted efforts in enhancing teaching methodologies and integrating technology have significantly bolstered students' generic skills. Our focus on collaborative learning and self-reflection has cultivated essential skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, and effective communication. The mentorship programmes and professional development initiatives have not only enriched teachers but also directly benefited students by creating a more engaging and interactive learning environment.

The use of online platforms and AI tools has empowered students to take charge of their learning, fostering independent study habits and digital literacy. The integration of reflective practices, such as Gibbs' Learning Cycle, has empowered students to critically assess their learning experiences, fostering a deeper understanding and application of knowledge. The implementation of student-led reflection conferences and peer feedback sessions has cultivated skills in self-evaluation and continuous improvement. Moreover, the use of technology in learning, from AI tools to online platforms, has encouraged independent study and digital proficiency. These efforts have equipped students with essential skills such as critical thinking, collaboration, and effective communication, preparing them for future academic and personal challenges.

1.2 To engage students in quality activities which help them to consolidate their generic skills and become reflective learners

To better prepare incoming students for life in secondary school and equip them with essential skills, our English and Maths departments offered summer bridging programmes. Feedback from participants indicated that they found these programmes genuinely beneficial and appreciated their relevance. Additionally, we have endeavoured to provide a diverse range of support initiatives aimed at both high achievers and those needing extra assistance. Gifted and enhancement programmes were implemented within core subjects, complemented by further initiatives organised by the Academic Committee. To foster critical thinking, a course was arranged for more able students in S2 over five Saturdays, enhancing their collaboration, communication, creativity, critical thinking, and problem-solving skills.

The school actively engaged in various initiatives to ensure inclusive education for students in need. For example, we participated in the AIM Project to facilitate better learning for students with autism spectrum disorder (ASD), and we implemented a peer power programme organised by the Education Bureau (EDB) to improve students' understanding of mental health issues and help them identify peers who may require further support.

Collaboration was a key focus in our learning environment. The BAFS Department partnered with the Computer Literacy subject organiser to run a group project on marketing and video production for S3 students during the first term. This initiative aimed to enhance collaboration skills and foster effective communication while allowing students to express their creativity. Many subjects incorporated group work into class activities, enabling students to practice a variety of skills through research, collating information, amending findings, and presenting results. Reflection and evaluation of their performance were integral to this process, encouraging continuous improvement as they faced new challenges.

The Academic Affairs, Counselling, Guidance and SEN, and Research and Development Committees jointly organised the "Be an Effective Learner" programme for S1 students. This programme included five workshops on Saturdays before the first organised test and received positive feedback, with a satisfaction rate of over 90%. It successfully helped 124 out of 132 S1 students adapt to their new school environment and cultivate effective learning habits.

Opportunities for self-directed learning beyond the classroom were also abundant. In Biology, for instance, 43% of students enhanced their understanding by attending public seminars, visiting blood donation venues, participating in educational outreach organised by Food for Good, and engaging in Biology Club activities. Senior biology students also participated in the STEM Challenge 2024 and organised health promotion activities, which included an organ donation exhibition and a quiz on organ donation.

The Chinese History Department offered students opportunities to participate in various territory-wide quiz competitions, where they performed commendably. The Geography Department arranged external mock exams for the S6 cohort, while S5 Economics students participated in an infographic challenge that improved their information technology skills and data literacy. Economic news was shared with S4 and S5 students via a WhatsApp group, fostering discussions around relevant topics. Throughout the year, interest classes for S4 and S5 students provided opportunities to explore activities such as Muay Thai, physical and mental health management, ukulele lessons, darts, 3D printing, planting, and coffee art. Feedback from participants was positive, with 85% agreeing that their generic skills were enhanced through participation.

In English, materials created for reflection during the cycle continue to be effectively utilised. Examples include S1 writing evaluation forms, Moodle post-writing evaluations, and Senior Form Learning Portfolio tracking forms. Our established procedures ensure that all students and teachers are familiar with these processes. Group work is a significant component of English lessons, exemplified by the S4 excursion project, where students collaborated to highlight the struggles of disadvantaged communities. Their projects took various forms—paintings, videos, sculptures, pamphlets, and presentations—showcasing exceptional creativity.

As a result of our initiatives in the English curriculum, we have cultivated a habit of reflection upon completing tasks. This process includes goal-setting and preparation for future activities. Performance scores from HKDSE past papers are collated and shared with students, providing them with a clearer understanding of their standing compared to a broader group. Other forms also engaged in project work, such as the S1 Chinese Festivals project, where students researched various festivals and created PowerPoint presentations. S2 students explored different types of Chinese Kung Fu, while S5 students produced radio dramas related to Lunar New Year folklore, complete with listening worksheets and answer keys. S6 students participated in excursion projects, allowing them to explore chosen topics collaboratively and present their findings in their preferred mediums.

Project-based learning has proven invaluable in consolidating students' understanding of generic skills across subjects. Geography and IS classes incorporated field trips and hydroponics, while History collaborated with English to provide local excursions for the S4 cohort, enabling students to connect with the locations and themes from their textbooks. Project learning was also evident in LA&SE, where students systematically and flexibly produced their items, which were then presented to the class.

Throughout the academic year, numerous opportunities for student-led discussions and feedback were integrated into the curriculum. Parents' Day discussions and English SBA consultations were student-led, enabling students to identify their strengths and weaknesses. Activities such as competitive dictations, role-playing, and presentations were part of the reflection process. After significant events—including STChallenge, Info Day, Open Day, Operation Santa Claus, and English for all day (EFAD)—students engaged in feedback sessions with teachers for detailed discussions and reflections, seeking improvement for future renditions and for their own self-improvement. Debriefing and feedback sessions were also arranged after leadership training activities.

The utilisation of IT-related learning platforms and tools continues to enhance our teaching and learning processes. The English Department has successfully employed platforms such as Wiseman, iLearner, and ClarityEnglish to facilitate self-regulated learning. Other departments utilised Moodle to upload videos, exercises, quizzes, and links to YouTube, enriching student learning. The ongoing use of eClass, Google, and Microsoft 365 also supported effective teaching. Various subjects incorporated online tools like Padlet, Google Slides, Flipgrid, Kahoot, and Canva to gamify learning and leverage technology. Additionally, student presentations were recorded and uploaded for assessment and sharing, providing further opportunities for creativity and practice. In STEM lessons, students learned coding through projects like the Buzz Wire Game, allowing them to explore their potential and technological abilities. AI programming was also employed in indoor and outdoor hydroponic systems for crop cultivation. Many reflective elements were transitioned online, including EFAD preparation work, such as Tak Talk scripts, game proposals, and progress tracking via Google Sheets.

These results indicate that our students have improved upon their results in the previous year with increases in Creativity (Efficacy) and Creativity (Science-related). As a school, the emphasis we have placed on assisting students in the development of different skills throughout this Development Cycle has certainly reaped positive rewards.

REFLECTION

- Through professional development sharings within committees and departments over the past three years of the Development Cycle, teachers have developed a good understanding of the Nine Generic Skills, Gibbs Reflective Cycle, and the SAMR model.
- With this year being the third and final year within this Development Cycle, the focus areas in the development of students' generic skills has improved. This shows that the methods and practices that have been developed by different departments and committees have been internalised and have led to improvements.
- Most statistics, when it comes to the development of generic skills have increased. However, even though a lot of activities and events have been run by different departments and committees, students have recorded a lower satisfaction rating when it comes to opportunities for cooperation. This perhaps implies that the activities that have been arranged have targeted students' individual enhancement rather than enhancement as a group or as a unit.
- It is also quite disheartening to see that students' intrinsic motivation ratings have also slightly decreased.

FEEDBACK AND FOLLOW-UP

- Although activities and events have long been areas of major focus within the school, giving more students more opportunities for collaboration would be beneficial in enhancing cooperation and preparing students for the future.
- Giving students from different clubs and teams the opportunity to cooperate with their peers in different clubs and teams would also be beneficial in helping students find value in cooperation.
- Helping students see value in their work and studies may be helpful in helping them developing a greater sense of intrinsic motivation in their studies.

Major Concern 2:

To further inculcate the Catholic core values through service learning.

> To engage students in quality activities which help them to learn and follow Jesus as servant leaders.

ACHIEVEMENTS

The school continues to emphasise the importance of servant leadership as a means to inculcate Catholic core values and a multitude of activities and events have been conducted to highlight this.

Service to those in need in the community continued to be promoted in school. The Service Learning and Moral and Civic Education Committee has placed great emphasis on enhancing students' exposure to various service opportunities both in and outside of Hong Kong. Students were given training to prepare them for the requirements of giving service through different workshops and programmes such as the 4C Training Programme, Social Service Training, Volunteer Training, and the VR Volunteer Training Workshop. They then participated in events and programmes such as the Easter Celebration with the Elderly, the CUHK Jockey Club – Children Eye Care Programme, the Pay Love Forward primary school tutoring programme, as well as a service tour that saw teachers taking a group of students to Seoul to take part in a wide range of service opportunities for the local communities there. One of the recurring events to facilitate this was the blood donation drives organised by Biology. 55 units of blood were collected over the course of the year. We also had students give their time at the Caritas Bazaar, they Carolled during Christmas in Tuen Mun Hospital, helped at SSPP Church during the Christmas service, and even served the elderly at the SSPP Church Easter Banquet.

Students who were not in significant leadership roles also took up different responsibilities and opportunities to serve their peers. An example of this was in LA&SE where subject leaders were responsible for distributing and arranging materials and ingredients needed for the class. They wholeheartedly served their peers and facilitated the progression of the classes as well. Maths recruited helpers to serve in the S1 Mathematics class selection test, Maths Olympiad, and the Hong Kong Primary Schools Mathematics Ability Competition. Students were also recruited to help with maintaining discipline and giving logistical support during the new S1 Summer Uniform pre-sale days held in July. During STChallenge and Info Day, besides the numerous students that helped with the different stalls put on by different Departments, more than 270 students and parents assisted in ensuring the successes of the day by serving our guests and visitors. Students taught primary school students in the district about the Robomaster programming and also the Robomaster competition that was held in school.

Clubs conducted activities to assist their junior form peers in preparing for examinations and tests. Different clubs and teams also continued to provide opportunities for their peers to participate in games and activities that were created for them. These include competitions to test students' content knowledge, tutorial classes to prepare them for exams and tests, and gatherings to help build a sense of community with their fellow Shungtakians.

The English Department places great emphasis on developing empathy, Catholic core values, and leadership in our students. One such project that was conducted this year was the S4 excursion project which saw students research and explore more about disadvantaged groups in our community. They then participated in an experiential learning opportunity at Crossroads International to learn more about the lives of the poor. This was followed by final products that were created and shared with parents and students during Parents Day at the end of the year. Students also served their peers by organising and running Operation Santa Claus which the English Department is endeavouring to make even more student-led and centred. Students also served the local kindergarten and primary school community through activities such as the Shared Reading Programme, where they conducted activities and read stories with their younger counterparts.

Also, students produced and shared items with the local community. In LA&SE, S2 students knitted scarves and donated them to the Salvation Army, delivering warmth and support to those within the community. In IS, students that participated in the hydroponics project grew vegetables and shared them with the elderly in the area, while Christmas cards were designed and distributed to the community under the guidance of RE.

Tasks and activities with themes related to the Catholic core values were completed throughout the year. In Visual Arts, S1 students created artwork based on these values and themes while classes that incorporated the appreciation of Catholic artwork helped prepare students for their own artwork. The Junior Form Singing Contest used the theme of "Our Faith" to promote the Catholic core values. Putonghua used prayer and teacher sharing at the beginning of each unit to draw out the core values and the relationship with students' lives. The values were emphasised and reiterated when discussing topics related to these during the discussion of papers in English. Junior form English Drama competitions were conducted with themes related to the Catholic core values and was also taken into consideration when deciding on the script and story of the English Drama Team performance. Guidance and SEN also used opportunities throughout the year to conduct talks and movie appreciation sessions that covered topics related to the core values.

And to further inculcate Catholic core values in our students, RE endeavoured to provide opportunities for our students. Prayer services were conducted for different events throughout the year, different OLE talks and activities were conducted, talks with Sr Jero were organised for S4 to S6 students, and a religious and cultural study tour to Italy to spend time with the fathers and sisters there was also conducted. Catechumenate classes led to the baptisms of four Shungtakians.

The need for our students to develop a sense of national and global identity to serve the community was also emphasised. Chinese Department once again organised the Chinese Cultural Day, bringing great fun and laughter to the campus, History highlighted the difficulties faced by the Chinese during the war and also collaborated with Chinese History to conduct thematic readings and site visits to learn more about the Sin-Japanese War as well as the defence of Hong Kong. History also collaborated with English to take students on an excursion to Little Hong Kong to learn more about the last location to fall to the Japanese during WW2. Reading and writing materials specifically related to the development of a sense of national and global identity were created in English. English also conducted the Tang Yuan Together food culture awareness event to keep in line with the annual Chinese Culture Awareness activities conducted by the department.

To praise and recognise the works of students, appreciation cards and certificates were presented to students at different times throughout the year. These included for members of the EFAD committee, the OSC Organising Committee, School Ambassadors,

To record and recognise student participation and service to the community, social service hours continue to be recorded. This year, the total number of volunteer service hours has amounted to 4,126 hours which is more than double of the number recorded in the previous year. 223 students received volunteer service awards in recognition of their efforts.

REFLECTION

- Students have indicated a marked improvement in family involvement with their schooling and future with a 41.9% and a 40.6% increase in these areas.
- 93% of students reported a better understanding about respecting and caring for those around them.
- Our efforts in instilling positive values and national identity have resulted in our students placing in the Top 15% of the Hong Kong Percentile when it comes to items related to National Identity.
- Our students also performed in the Top 15% when it comes to Global Perspective.
- We have also recorded a significant increase in volunteering work frequency from 47.3% in the previous year to 63.1% this year.

FEEDBACK AND FOLLOW-UP

- ◆ Teachers and students should be reminded of the materials and resources created for the purpose of delivering on values-related themes.
- Continue to conduct activities and events that highlight and emphasise the awareness and understanding of students' cultural heritage and national identity.
- Habits of service and serving the less fortunate must be continued as we inculcate empathy in our students.




